Rosa Parks

Read the following passage, or have a parent read it to you and answer the questions as best you can in complete sentences.

Rosa Parks was born in Tuskegee, Alabama on February 4, 1913. Her father was a carpenter and her mother was a teacher. Rosa's mother wanted Rosa to complete high school. At the time, that was very difficult for an African American girl. However, Rosa went back to school to earn her high school diploma after she got married.

Rosa grew up during a time of *segregation*, or when things were very different for white and black people. There were separate schools, churches, stores, and even different water fountains. When Rosa took the bus to get to work she would have to sit in the back of the bus. On December 1, 1955 Rosa made her famous stand. Rosa sat down on the bus after working all day long. When a white man boarded the bus, Rosa was told to stand so the white man could sit down. Rosa refused to give up her seat. When Rosa wouldn't move, the police were called and she was arrested.

After Rosa's arrest, black leaders got together and decided to *boycott*, or not use the city buses. This became known as the Montgomery Bus Boycott. It was not easy for people to boycott buses because they were the only form of transportation for many African Americans. They had to walk to work or ride in a carpool. However, their boycott worked and after 381 days the U.S. Supreme Court Ruled that the segregation laws in Alabama were unconstitutional. Rosa's brave actions helped end segregation in the United States.
